SAMPFORDS' FLOWER SHOW—a general guide

- · Please read the schedule carefully; adhere to any specific instructions
- · Only winners are 'named' so don't be afraid to put in an entry
- Older children and teenagers no longer have a separate section and can enter all classes in sections A, B, C and E

SECTION A: VEGETABLES

Open to all age groups

- This section is judged primarily on the quality of the exhibits
- Where the quality and uniformity of exhibits are equal, presentation may then be taken into account
- When a number of specimens are to be presented, uniformity is also taken into account, eg, pods should be of a similar size and maturity
- Specimens should be clean and ideally blemish and insect free
- Please leave the bloom on soft fruit
- The culinary herbs may be presented in a container of water
- Collections of vegetables can be presented in a box, basket or tray
- Please remove growing medium from vegetables
- · Double points will be awarded for classes 6 and 17
- Plate of soft fruit
- 2. 3 potatoes; 1 variety
- 3. 3 carrots; foliage trimmed
- 4. Any vegetable
- 5. 5 salad onions
- 6. Collection of salad vegetables
- 7. 5 pods of French beans
- 8. 3 stems of rhubarb; leaves removed
- 9. 5 pods of broad beans
- 10. 3 onions from seed or set; foliage trimmed
- 11. Minimum of 3 edible flowers

- 12. 3 beetroot; leaves trimmed
- 13. 1 cabbage; round or pointed
- 14. 1 lettuce
- 15. 1 potato; any variety
- 16. Collection of at least 3 cut culinary herbs; please label
- 17. Collection of vegetables; any type
- 18. 3 courgettes
- 19. 5 stems of chard in water
- 20. Best disaster!
- 21. Any vegetable grown by a young person (pre-school to year 11)

SECTION B: FLOWERS

Open to all age groups

- Blooms and plants are judged primarily on their quality and not that of the container they are in
- · All flowers should preferably have unblemished petals, leaves and stems
- Flower specimens should ideally be in their prime, ie, not too immature and not going to seed
- Specimens should be clean and ideally blemish and insect free
- Please do not overfill containers with water
- Annuals to have been grown from seed in 2023
- No oasis to be used
- 22. Cactus or succulent
- 23. 3 pansies or violas with own foliage
- 24. 3 sweet peas; no foliage
- 25. A rose; flower and a bud(s)
- 26. 1 rose
- 27. A scented bloom
- 28. 6 stems of flowers; can be mixed
- 29. Flowering shrub; 1 single spray
- 30. 1 single specimen bloom; any variety

- 31. Container of mixed garden flowers; variety/quality to be considered
- 32. 3 clematis flowers; floating
- 33. 3 flowering fuchsia stems in water; can be different varieties
- 34. House plant
- 35. 3 hosta leaves
- 36. Miniature garden in a cup and saucer
- 37. Flower arrangement in a basket; bought flowers may be used

SECTION C: DOMESTIC

Open to all age groups

Food and Drink-Classes 38 to 52

- Food items are judged on a combination of flavour, texture, appearance and presentation
- If more than one item is required, uniformity is important
- The domestic judge usually cuts cakes, etc, in half to check that they are properly cooked and to inspect the texture
- Try to avoid 'cooling rack marks' when turning out your cakes
- · You can use doilies. Paper plates are acceptable
- For jams, etc, use a clean jar, filled to the shoulders, with a waxed disc put on the top of the hot contents. Put a cellophane disk on when the filling is either very hot or completely cold. Make sure that labels are straight
- · Savoury preserves should not be in contact with metal lids
- Please cover entries for classes 39 and 44-48 inclusive with a 'cling film' type material or large clear plastic bag
- For liqueurs, make sure that your contents are clear (ie, not cloudy), the bottle is clean and well filled and that the label is straight
- Beer, cider and cordial should be in a clean bottle, which is well filled, with a straight label
- · Use your freezer if you need to bake ahead of time
- Airtight boxes can be used to store biscuits

Photography, Arts and Crafts—Classes 53 to 59

- The photographs can be black and white or colour and it is the photo, not the mount and framing, which is the most important
- They may be taken using any equipment and MUST be taken by the exhibitor. Maximum size A4
- The finish in sewn items is important; remember to remove tacking threads and trim loose ends
- · Remember to sew in the ends of yarn for knitted and crocheted items

Recipe for Victoria Sandwich (Class 46)

Ingredients	Method
3 eggs The weight of the 3 eggs in their shells of: caster sugar softened unsalted butter self-raising flour (sifted)	 Cream the butter and sugar until white and fluffy Crack the eggs into a bowl. Beat lightly and add slowly to sugar and butter mixture, beating well between additions. If mixture curdles, add a spoon of flour and beat well Fold the sifted flour into mixture Transfer mixture to two greased bottom-lined 7"/18 cm sandwich tins Bake in the middle of a pre-heated oven at 180 °C/350 °F/gas mark 4 for approximately 25 minutes until the tops are golden, bounce back when touched lightly in the centre and the edges shrink away from the side of the tin Allow to cool slightly before turning out onto a rack and allowing to cool completely Sandwich together with raspberry jam and sprinkle the top with some extra caster

FLOWER SHOW RULES

ENTRIES

The show is open to everyone

No mixes or kits are allowed (unless stated otherwise) and all exhibits must be homegrown or homemade by the exhibitor

Only one entry will be accepted in each class from any one exhibitor
All exhibits will be accepted between 8.30 and 10.00 am on the day of the show
All entries are free. No late entries will be accepted

ACCESS

Everyone, except show officials, must vacate the hall by 10.10 am

No further entry will be granted until 2.00 pm. No exhibit is to be removed before 3.00 pm.

JUDGING

The decisions of the management committee and the judges they appoint are final. The judges shall have the power to withhold prizes if they consider there is no exhibit of sufficient merit and shall generally award only one prize in any class where there are less than four entries. A third prize to be awarded at the judges' discretion.

It is helpful if exhibitors provide details such as name, address and class entry numbers on a sheet of paper

Exhibit cards, which are issued at the show, must be left on the exhibit when staged. In the case of children's classes, the age of the child must be entered on the exhibit cards when issued

CUPS

Cups will be awarded at 2.30 pm in the hall to the person(s) gaining the most points in classes as follows:

Vegetable Cup-classes1 to 21 inclusive

Flower Cup-classes 22 to 37 inclusive

The Domestic Cup-classes 38 to 52 inclusive

The Joyce Harnwell Trophy—Sampfords' resident in classes 38 to 59 inclusive

Children's Cup-classes 60 to 70 inclusive, and classes 78 and 79

Sampfords' Youth Club Challenge Shield—classes 71 to 79 inclusive

<u>The Hughes' Memorial Trophy</u>—young person (school years 7 to 11) gaining the most points in the show

<u>Parish Council Shield</u>—young person (pre-school to year 11) gaining most points in the show <u>Rupert Lee Family Cup</u>—Sampfords' family (all living at one address) gaining the most points in the show

The Frank Edwards Cup-presented to the winner of class 79

WI Adult Cup—Presented for the favourite adult exhibit chosen by a representative of the WI WI Junior Cup—Presented for the favourite exhibit by a young person chosen by a representative of the WI

Points will be awarded as follows: 1st—7 points, 2nd—4 points, 3rd—2 points, highly recommended—1 point
